Baptized...

As we begin the season of Epiphany, we stand perplexed beside John at the Jordan. "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" (Matthew 3:13). Perplexed because we know, we experienced baptism as a washing away of sin; and yet we confess Jesus to be perfect, the sinless Son of God. And then we hear Jesus' almost cryptic response. "*Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness.*" (Matthew 3:15).

What does he mean, "to fulfill all righteousness?" In Matthew's Gospel, "to fulfill" refers to the completion, the consummation, the conclusion of the Old Testament Scriptures and particularly with regard to God's plan of salvation. But what is the "righteousness" of which the first testament speaks? Quite simply, God's righteousness as it becomes evident through his intervention in human history for the benefit of his chosen people. It is his saving hand in action. Take a moment and read Psalm 71; note especially verse 15. *My mouth will tell of your righteous acts, of your deeds of salvation all the day, for their number is past my knowledge.*

As Jesus comes to John at the Jordan, he sets in motion God's plan of salvation for his people. Jesus submits to the baptism that sinful Israel undergoes for repentance by taking on our sin. It is fitting because it demonstrates "how" Jesus "*will save his people from their sins*" (Matthew 1.21). Jesus stands in our place here in the Jordan and ultimately on the cross. There the sinless one will offer up his life as a ransom for many — the full payment for sin.

Stephen Stark captures the movement from the Jordan to Calvary well in his hymn "Jesus, Once with Sinners Numbered" (LSB 404.3).

This the baptism that our Savior greatly longed to undergo;

He, the chosen and anointed Son of God, sent to redeem.

This the crimson cleansing needed so the world God's love might know;

This the mission of Messiah as He stepped from Jordan's stream,

You and I are redeemed as the pastor sprinkles the water and speaks the Word over us in baptism. Redeemed on account of the "crimson cleansing" of Jesus' life-blood on the cross. And today, whether a few hours, years, or decades later, we are still redeemed. So, as we begin our Epiphany journey, as we experience the steps and missteps of life we recall – We are still baptized! When Satan rises up to accuse us — We are still baptized! When our conscience assails us — We are still baptized! When death overtakes us — We are still baptized! Thanks be to God the Father who gives us the victory in our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

"Angels we have heard on high,
Sweetly singing o'er the plains,
and the mountains in reply,
Echoing their joyous strains."
(LSB 368.1) What a beautiful time
of year, the music, the church
services, the choirs, the

decorations, family, friends, and gifts. I could go on and on. We celebrate Christ's birth year after year. Some years are precious and memorable, others seem like a chore and rather like the Grinch, bah humbug.

As Christians, we focus our love and rejoice for the ultimate gift from God: Jesus. "We praise You Jesus, at Your birth; Clothed in flesh You came to earth. The virgin bears a sinless boy, And all the angels sing for joy Alleluia! (LSB 382.1)

Christmas is over, now what? "What Child is This?" "So bring Him incense, gold, and myrrh; Come, peasant, king, to own Him. The King of kings salvation brings; Let loving hearts enthrone Him. Raise, raise the song on high, The virgin sings her lullaby, Joy, joy, for Christ is born, the babe, the son of Mary!" (LSB 370.3) The wise men from the east come to Bethlehem bringing gifts and to worship the child which was foretold in scriptures of old. These Wise men point to the child as the Promised one. As Epiphany passes by, we often pack away the story and the message along with the last of our decorations.

We can get back to our own routines. Winter is here, a dreary time of year, cold and sad looking. We are not to mope in our mean estate, or to be downcast. This is not why Christ came. His birth, life and death, and resurrection point us to joy. "Wake, awake, for night is flying,' The watchmen on the heights are crying; 'Awake Jerusalem, arise!' Zion hears the watchmen singing And all her heart with joy is springing; She wakes, she rises from her gloom. For her Lord comes down all glorious, The strong in grace, in truth victorious; Her star is ris'n, her light is come.

Now come, Thou Blessed One, Lord Jesus, God's own Son, Hail! Hosanna! We enter all the wedding hall to eat the supper at Thy call." (LSB 516.1a, 2)

Paul describes his life of faith which we could implement as our own New Year's Resolution Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord.

For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but that which comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God that depends on faith— that I may know him and the power of his resurrection, and may share his sufferings, becoming like him in his death, that by any means possible I may attain the resurrection from the dead (Philippians 3:8-11).

This is the joy we have in our love of Christ. Our faith and hope of the resurrection given to us through Christ Jesus. A happy and joyous reason to celebrate all year, every year. No humbug here! "Oh, the joy beyond expressing When by faith we grasp this blessing, And to You we come confessing That Your love has set us free. Gracious Child, we pray, O hear us, From Your lowly manger cheer us, Gently lead us and be near us Till we join Your choir above." (LSB 375.5,6).

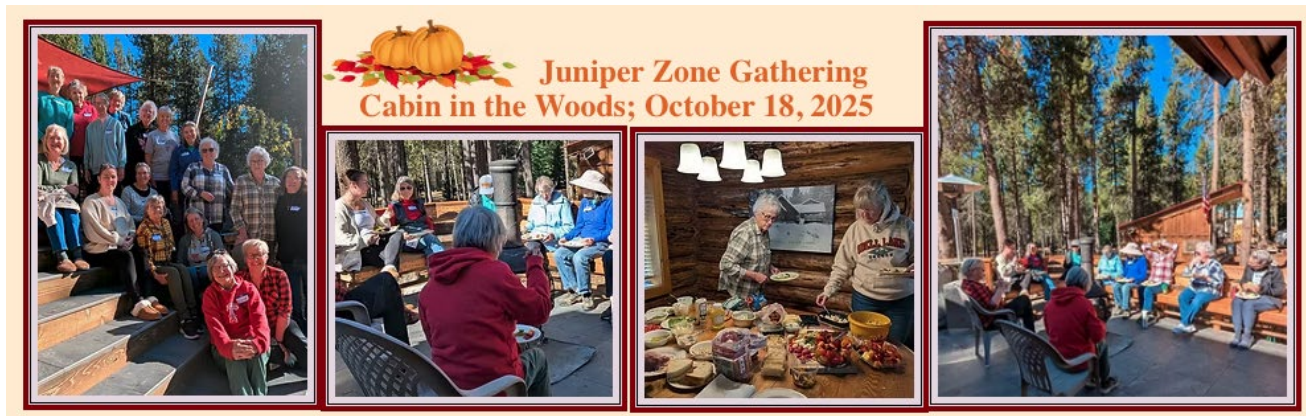
