STRETCH:

O Lord my God, you are very great! You are clothed with splendor and majesty, covering yourself with light as with a garment, stretching out the heavens like a tent (Psalm 104:1b–2).

WALK:

Whoever says he abides in him ought to walk in the same way in which he walked. (1 John 2:6).

RUN:

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us (Hebrews 12:1).

WEIGHTS:

Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ (Galatians 6:2).

RELAY:

Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus (Philippians 3:13–14).

DEEP KNEE BENDS:

So that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth (Philippians 2:10).

COOL-DOWN:

Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. (Matthew 11:28).

But they who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength; they shall mount up with wings like eagles; they shall run and not be weary; they shall walk and not faint. (Isaiah 40:31).

POTENTIAL:

I can do all things through him who strengthens me. (Philippians 4:13).

God's Word is always trustworthy, and in it He tells us that He loves us unconditionally. He has made us new, so that we are in Christ, re-created to be His holy children. I encourage you to search the Bible for more of this wonderful truth; let it settle deeply into your heart and soul, and then help others to hear and know all that He has done for you and all the world.

Welcome our new Senior Pastoral Counselor Pastor Brian Larson!



I have served as St. John's, Vancouver, pastor since 2015. Our family moved here from Ohio (we lived in Arizona before that). This is the third congregation I have served since 2003, when I completed my ministry training with Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri. I grew up in a small town, an hour west of St. Louis (no wonder I am an avid Cardinals baseball fan!).

My parents retired, after dad served for 30 years as a Lutheran pastor and mom supported our family and her community with several different jobs. My mom now lives with Jesus and my dad lives with my sister's family in Nebraska. Jesus called my sister to serve as a music teacher in a Lutheran high school, and her husband to serve as a pastor of a vibrant, rural Lutheran church in Nebraska. Our parents and a great church family provided wonderful examples that contributed to both of us becoming church workers.

My wife, Sarah, also grew up as a pastor's kid, living several places on the west coast. Her parents live here in Vancouver and we are glad to be this close. Sarah and I met in St. Louis where we studied together at Concordia Seminary. She earned a Masters in Theology, and what she has learned about God drives her devotion to our kids, her friends, and her work as a highly capable administrative professional for Thrivent Financial.

Our family spent seven years as licensed foster care providers. We aren't a perfect family, but I believe that God does amazing work in the home (even when we are not completely put together). It's a great setting to lean into His Word, express His forgiveness, experience His grace, and grow in our faith. We are no longer a fostering family, and we are finding new ways to walk along with Jesus in the mission field of our daily lives.

God called us to this community that He loves and we continue to learn how to move with Him in our little niches here – whether with our church, at our schools, ball fields, or neighborhood. We get to be a small part of Jesus' big job of redeeming people, restoring lives, and reconciling people to His Father.

I am amazed that Jesus lets me work with Him to serve His Church. I love preaching, teaching, and caring for people because it gives me the opportunity to put the focus on Jesus. I love helping people discover the reconciliation Jesus gives us with the Father. I love helping people understand that Jesus' Easter resurrection gives us hope for a future with no more dysfunction, disease, or death. The future with Jesus is so good! It makes a big difference to live in light of His presence now and the hope of the future He has earned for us.

Settling In – Psalm 65

It's October. The days are going shorter, the harvests are in or coming in shortly. Here on the coast preparations for the rainy season fill the day — getting the firewood in, cleaning the gutters, etc. In the midst of these preparations, I invite you to turn to Psalm 65 with me as we reflect on the season.

Historically Psalm 65 was read on the first Sunday of the liturgical new year, the "crown of the season" (see Psalm 65:11). In our current lectionary it is read twice in series A, in proper 10 during the season of Pentecost and then again for the Harvest Observance in all three series. James Mays summaries, "Psalm 65 is a song of joyful praise. From the beginning to end, it does not cease its grateful recital of God's works and their benefits" (219).

The congregation along with the psalmist enter God's presence in his temple. *Praise is due to you, O God, in Zion... you who hear prayer* (Psalm 65:1, 2). Thanksgiving begins with a recognition of whose we are and to whom we give thanks. As we enter *the holiness of your temple* (Psalm 65: 4) we confess our sin and receive atonement. St. John writes, *the blood of Jesus his Son cleanses us from all sin* (1 John 1:7). We "settle in" to the change of season confident and *blessed...to dwell in your courts* (Psalm 65:4). Stanza one: God in his temple.

From the steps of the temple the psalmist looks out with a cosmic view asking, just who is this God who forgives and elects? He sees a God of *awesome deeds* (Psalm 65:5), who by his strength established the mountains (Psalm 65:6), and stills the roaring of the seas (Psalm 65:7). Our Savior is also our Creator.

Indeed the signs of his power in creation are the assurance of his power to save. We "settle in" as those who dwell at the ends of the earth...in awe at your signs (Psalm 65:8). Stanza two: God of the world.


From the cosmos to the ground, the psalmist's gaze takes in the fields and vineyards that surround Jerusalem asking, who is this that cares for even the least of creation? Central to the experience of the psalmist, to all who live in an arid land, water is a blessing of God. You visit the earth and water it: you greatly enrich it...(Psalm 65:9). Dry ground yields to the plow reluctantly turning up clods in irregular furrows but God settling its ridges, softening it with showers, and blessing its growth (Psalm 65:10). It is God who produces the harvest, his wagon tracks overflow with abundance (Psalm 65:11). And then the final paean of praise, a picture of all creation girded with joy, the splendor of our fall colors lights up our eyes with joy as we "settle in" at the changing of the season. Stanza three: God of the earth.

Settle in. No matter what the change of season or circumstance that faces you in the coming days know that God is in His temple. He continues to hold all of creation in His hand. And He will bless you with His bounty. Amen.

(Lutheran Service Book 681.1)


As the day lengthens, the sun rises higher giving us distinguishing details of our surroundings. Our scene broadens, our focus adjusts. We study God's word, and pray that we are able to focus on God's will for our life. For the Law was given by Moses; grace and truth came in Jesus Christ (John 4:17). We ask ourselves: "do I turn right or left?" We make our choice keeping God's word as part of our decision making process. If the choices are similar pray and make a choice. Then rely on God's promise to be with you always. Remember Joseph from the Old Testament? He was sold to traders. But Joseph maintained his faithfulness and the Lord blessed Him. Was his road smooth? No, Joseph met challenges along the way. Your choice may meet challenges too. But the Lord will be with you, comforting you. Again, Jesus spoke to them, saying "I am the light of the world, whoever follows me will not walk in darkness. But will have the light of life" (John 8:12).

The Israelite and God's Provisions

Most of you know that I moved to Junction City, Oregon about six months ago. We left our home of 23 years in Scappoose, Oregon to be closer to my in-laws in Eugene and to help with the care they are now requiring at this stage in their lives. I would say that I turned into an Israelite about two weeks after we settled into our new home.

If you have ever read the book of Exodus, you will see how God's people grumbled and complained as they wandered in the wilderness. No matter what provisions God gave to them they would moan and groan about how bad their lives were. Manna would fall from heaven and they would complain. Water was provided and they complained. Moses heard nothing promising from these people. They turned on God and always wanted more. Sound familiar?

That is who I became after living in my new home for about two weeks. I did nothing but complain. I complained about the town, I complained about my brand-new home, I complained that I had no friends, I complained about not knowing how to get to places, and the list just grew and grew. I am not sure how my husband Rich tolerated it. A very positive person had suddenly turned into a whiner and sniveler. I hated everything, every day. God's provisions were terrible and I found myself traveling through the wilderness day after day, just like the Israelites. I was mad at God and He knew it!

It took at trip back to Scappoose just a few weeks ago to turn things around for me. We were headed back home in my mind. I could not wait to see my friends, hang out with the people I knew and loved and just be "home" for a while. Maybe I would get lucky and we would decide to move back home. That would be just fine with me. No more Junction City, no more in-laws to care for, and no more wilderness to traverse through.

After two days in town, I asked my husband if we could go home. This was the first time since our move that I referred to our new place as home. I am not sure what caused this change in my attitude. Something had shifted.

I guess when you hear the saying "you can never go home again" there might be some truth to that. The places all seemed the same, the people we spent time with all seemed the same, but something had changed. I had changed.

I realized that I was looking at the places and the people as if I were a visitor. And that was indeed what I was, a visitor. I had a new home, a new town, new church, and new responsibilities. I no longer lived in Scappoose.


The Israelite and God's Provisions continued





