It was humbling to honor Martin Luther, who in 1517 rocked the Protestant world with his writings on "the wall," teaching salvation, eternal life, and the free gift of God's GRACE, through our faith in Jesus Christ!

We find ourselves busy decorating our homes for my favorite season, Fall, stepping into November, when in 1863, (in the middle of the American Civil War,) Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday of the month be a national holiday: Thanksgiving." How? When?..... The Bible mentions giving thanks 98 times! And you can find a form of the word 'thankfulness' at least 73 times in the New Testament alone. Shouldn't we ALWAYS and in All WAYS be giving thanks? We are, 160 years later, giving thanks for the gifts given by and from our Loving Lord. We hear Paul giving thanks to his people in Ephesus, reminding us of ceaseless **prayer:** I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, (Ephesians 1:16). We hear Paul again to the people of Colosse, (whom he had yet to meet): We always thank God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, when we pray for you, since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and of the love that you have for all the saints, (Colossians 1:3-4).

Would that we in witness would like that abundance at Thanksgiving time to spread to our daily opportunities to witness His Goodness and share with those we love, and those who have yet to come to the knowledge of God, the Love and Grace unending. The next time you have a request from a friend addressing a personal need, OR want to simply send greetings to a friend, tuck in Paul's wonderful two simple sentences: Phil. 1:3-6 NIV: I thank my God every time I remember you. In all my prayers for all of you, I always pray with joy because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. Being confident of this, that He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Jesus Christ.

What a privilege then, to carry everything to God in prayer, and be lifted up on eagle's wings!
